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# CAPT Bryan Jay Weaver, CHC, USN (1955-2016)

In the always perfect and wise providence of our Sovereign God, CAPT Bryan Jay Weaver, CHC, USN, was taken from this life into the arms of his Faithful Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ, Saturday, 2 April 2016, at 1707 hours EDT and thus transferred to the Church Triumphant. "He fought the good fight and finished the course." In his last minutes on earth, a Navy corpsman prayed with him and the last words on his lips were "Jesus, Jesus", repeated several times. The command of Naval Hospital Beaufort, Beaufort, SC provided a Marine honor guard in dress blues to transfer the body to a local funeral home.

The funeral will be held Monday, 11 April in Beaufort, SC, followed by burial in Beaufort National Cemetery. He will be buried in his Marine uniform.

Since December 2013 Bryan had some nine cancer related brain procedures. His wife Shelly said "he was a faithful servant to his calling to the very end".

Bryan was born 5 May 1955. He married his wife Shelly Buckhalt 21 June 1980. They have three sons: Grant, Kurt and Trent. He attended Taylor University (B.A., 1978), Westminster Theological Seminary, Reformed Presbyterian Theological Seminary (M.Div., 1983), Trinity Evangelical Divinity School (Th.M., 1997).

Bryan served as a Navy chaplain for 30 years and 5 months, 21 years of which were with the United States Marine Corps (a possible record). His Commanding Officer with the 2<sup>nd</sup> Marine Division was General James F. Amos, later 35<sup>th</sup> Commandant of the Marine Corps. During Division combat operations about 2004 in Iraq, he gave Bryan the nickname "Battle Chaps" for crawling from "fighting hole to fighting hole" under fire encouraging Marines and in the process teaching NCOs and officers what it is to be Leaders of Marines. He was a faithful servant of King Jesus. He was awarded the Navy peer elected John H. Craven Servant Award in 2014 and the RPTS Life Time Service Award in December 2015.

In his time with the Marines, he served as Command Chaplain of a Battalion in the 1<sup>st</sup> Marine Division, and later, the 24<sup>th</sup> Expeditionary Unit, the 2<sup>nd</sup> Marine Division, the 2<sup>nd</sup> Marine Expeditionary Force, Marine Force Command, Norfolk and Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island, SC.

Praise God that in the last couple of years, Bryan, who had faithfully ministered to so many, in God's gracious providence had Christian Commanding Officers and Command Chaplains to minister to him and his family at both Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island and at MCAS Beaufort, SC

I can testify that he feared God, and not man, as well as any man I have ever known, and I have been privileged to call him my friend. Please pray for his faithful wife Shelly and their fine sons, Grant, Kurt and Trent. Romans 12:12 - *Rejoicing in hope; patient in tribulation; continuing instant in prayer;* To God be the Glory!

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## Prayer focus - Christ's resurrection assures us that the grave will not be our end.

But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us, even when we were dead in our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved—and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, so that in the coming ages he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. (Eph. 2:4-7)

The truth of Christ's death and resurrection is foundational to our faith. It is the power of the gospel to radically transform lives. How much more could a person change than from being dead to being alive? Without this doctrine our hopes for eternity are dashed. It is by holding fast to the truth of the resurrection that we can stand firm in the face of trials, the chief of which is our own bodily death. Where would we be if Christ were still dead? Where would our hope be if our Redeemer, the first-fruits of those raised from the dead, had not promised that we will be raised like him? If there is no resurrection then our hopes can only be in this life and, as Paul says in 1 Cor. 15:19, we of all men are to be most pitied. On the contrary, our eternal justification is inexorably tied to the truth of Christ's resurrection and his promise that we will be like him. His resurrection assures us of our own.

In Eph. 2:4-7 Paul talks about the future promise of our resurrection in the past tense. It is so sure that it is already a "done deal", though it has not yet occurred. We see a picture of bodily resurrection in God's work of creation and providence, especially in seeds that are planted to produce food. Seeds are dead for all practical purposes, planted in the ground, and brought forth in fullness of time into a productive plant bearing fruit. But the most compelling picture of our bodily resurrection, by far, is Christ's resurrection from the dead. Through it we can be assured of our future bodily resurrection to newness of life, seated with Christ in the heavenlies.

We ought to regularly consider and seek the full assurance of faith and hope in Christ's resurrection, that in the face of our own pain and death we may not fear being buried in the grave; assured that although our bodies may "sleep" there for a little while, our souls will immediately be present with the Savior. Remain steadfast, therefore, firm in the faith of the gospel, unmovable in your hope of being raised incorruptible at the last day. Always abound in the work of the Lord, doing the Lord's service, and obeying the Lord's commands (1 Cor 15:58). May Christ increase your faith, that you may not only be safe in your duties, but filled with joy and victorious in your callings as Chaplains, Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen, Marines, and Coast Guardsmen.

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Please pray for our valiant men of war to call out to God continually for strength to enable victory over the enemy and that they will continue to be well equipped for battle. And please pray that our nation will be led by humble leaders who call on the name of the Lord and rule righteously that we might have peace. Please pray that God will *show himself strong in the behalf of them whose heart is perfect toward him.* Pray that they will fear only God and not man and be of a good courage. Pray that they will be bold as a lion and that the wicked will flee. (Prov. 28:1)

Pray as we battle forces both foreign and domestic in our long war; plead with our God to make a way of escape from defeat, from losing heart in the battle and that in doing so, God will restore us as a nation to His righteousness. Pray for the gracious and needed gift from God of genuine national repentance; especially from the iniquities of abortion, supporting homosexuality, the widespread disregard of the fourth commandment and rejection of the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

Continue to pray that we will recognize the true nature of the enemy. Be not weary in hoping, praying and waiting to see the salvation of our great God whose new mercies come every morning! Pray that the Gospel may continue to have free expression. Pray that the culture of death will be defeated and that our nation will stand united and will endure in the defense of freedom. Please continue to pray for the spouses, children, parents and siblings of our warriors. Pray for the families of the fallen and for the wounded that they may all endure and come to rest and trust in Christ. May they defend our nation's liberties as guaranteed by our Constitution with stalwart hearts and minds!

We have lives precious to us in harm's way: Cody, **John**, Neal and Samuel. New deployments are shown in bold.

- Please pray for John, who is as others noted above, is in a combat zone. He has been out for several months and is scheduled to return in about two months. Note the number deployed in harm's way is again increasing. As is often the case, two of these are Marines on the "tip of the spear".
- Please continue to pray for the continuing recovery of Carolyn Parker, wife of retired Navy chaplain Stephen Parker. After a long recovery from a badly broken leg after a bad fall last July, last month she suffered a heart attack. Praise God for sustaining her life, for their daughter Anna's care and the support of the Bonita OPC session and congregation.
- Please pray for Chaplain John Carter for healing of a medical condition that has been caught early and is being treated.

- The revision of DADT presents difficulties for many Christians, both those serving in line positions and those serving as chaplains. Therefore we urge you to pray:

  - 4. That the heretofore moral standards of our military will not be severely denigrated by those of good moral character leaving this godly calling,
  - 5. That the Committee and Commission will have wisdom in order to protect those who serve. Praise God that the Commission has adopted additional protections for our chaplains. Please pray that God will grant a powerful and sustained protection for our chaplains from this revision.
  - 6. That our military, which has taken an oath defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies foreign and domestic, will not be diminished or perish,
  - 7. That this trial will not also in time descend on the pulpits of our land.
