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CAPT Bryan Jay Weaver, CHC, USN (1955-2016)

Following a "Service of Divine Worship and Thanksgiving" at an historic cathedral style church in downtown Beaufort, SC, OPC Chaplain, CAPT Bryan Jay Weaver, CHC, USN aka "BattleChaps" was laid to rest until the resurrection in Beaufort National Cemetery with full military honors, 11 April 2016. Local PCA pastor, the Rev. Alex Mark preached the sermon and retired chaplain Edward Fleagle conducted the interment service, both clearly preaching our Resurrected Christ.

There was a large gathering included friends from across the land, Marines and Sailors, several OPC chaplains, both active and retired, ruling elders (four from Weaver's home church in PA), PRCC Executive Director Doug Lee, and the Marine Corps Chaplain. Citadel Cadets (where son Trent is a junior) in dress white uniforms lined the path to the church. Senior officers were seen everywhere and about a platoon of Marines in dress blues provided the honor detail. There were over 30 Navy Chaplains in attendance. One speaker introduced himself as one of Bryan's "over 500 best friends." An active duty Marine officer and OPC member was one of the speakers.

Bryan once stated "Men who come out to a combat zone either find their faith or they lose their faith." BattleChaps was there to help these young men find their faith. He leaned heavily on John 11:25 – Jesus said unto her, I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live:

In addition to his unit and service awards, his personal awards include Legion of Merit (one gold star), Bronze Star, Meritorious Service Medal (one gold star), Navy Commendation Medal (three gold stars), Coast Guard Achievement Medal (one gold star), Navy Achievement Medal and Fleet Marine Force (FMFQO) Qualification Officer insignia. Eight rows of awards.

One officer wrote: "We are all continually amazed at Bryan's spirit and his stamina over the past two years. 'BattleChaps' has been his typically stellar role model throughout. We have lost a special friend, a truly spirited life example and a steadfast leader..."

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Prayer focus - Christ's resurrection assures us that the grave will not be our end.

But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us, even when we were dead in our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved—and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, so that in the coming ages he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. (Eph. 2:4-7)

The truth of Christ's death and resurrection is foundational to our faith. It is the power of the gospel to radically transform lives. How much more could a person change than from being dead to being alive? Without this doctrine our hopes for eternity are dashed. It is by holding fast to the truth of the resurrection that we can stand firm in the face of trials, the chief of which is our own bodily death. Where would we be if Christ were still dead? Where would our hope be if our Redeemer, the first-fruits of those raised from the dead, had not promised that we will be raised like him? If there is no resurrection then our hopes can only be in this life and, as Paul says in 1 Cor. 15:19, we of all men are to be most pitied. On the contrary, our eternal justification is inexorably tied to the truth of Christ's resurrection and his promise that we will be like him. His resurrection assures us of our own.

In Eph. 2:4-7 Paul talks about the future promise of our resurrection in the past tense. It is so sure that it is already a "done deal", though it has not yet occurred. We see a picture of bodily resurrection in God's work of creation and providence, especially in seeds that are planted to produce food. Seeds are dead for all practical purposes, planted in the ground, and brought forth in fullness of time into a productive plant bearing fruit. But the most compelling picture of our bodily resurrection, by far, is Christ's resurrection from the dead. Through it we can be assured of our future bodily resurrection to newness of life, seated with Christ in the heavenlies.

We ought to regularly consider and seek the full assurance of faith and hope in Christ's resurrection, that in the face of our own pain and death we may not fear being buried in the grave; assured that although our bodies may "sleep" there for a little while, our souls will immediately be present with the Savior. Remain steadfast, therefore, firm in the faith of the gospel, unmovable in your hope of being raised incorruptible at the last day. Always abound in the work of the Lord, doing the Lord's service, and obeying the Lord's commands (1 Cor 15:58). May Christ increase your faith, that you may not only be safe in your duties, but filled with joy and victorious in your callings as Chaplains, Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen, Marines, and Coast Guardsmen.

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Please pray for our valiant men of war to call out to God continually for strength to enable victory over the enemy and that they will continue to be well equipped for battle. And please pray that our nation will be led by humble leaders who call on the name of the Lord and rule righteously that we might have peace. Please pray that God will *show himself strong in the behalf of them whose heart is perfect toward him.* Pray that they will fear only God and not man and be of a good courage. Pray that they will be bold as a lion and that the wicked will flee. (Prov. 28:1)

Pray as we battle forces both foreign and domestic in our long war; plead with our God to make a way of escape from defeat, from losing heart in the battle and that in doing so, God will restore us as a nation to His righteousness. Pray for the gracious and needed gift from God of genuine national repentance; especially from the iniquities of abortion, supporting homosexuality, the widespread disregard of the fourth commandment and rejection of the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

Continue to pray that we will recognize the true nature of the enemy. Be not weary in hoping, praying and waiting to see the salvation of our great God whose new mercies come every morning! Pray that the Gospel may continue to have free expression. Pray that the culture of death will be defeated and that our nation will stand united and will endure in the defense of freedom. Please continue to pray for the spouses, children, parents and siblings of our warriors. Pray for the families of the fallen and for the wounded that they may all endure and come to rest and trust in Christ. May they defend our nation's liberties as guaranteed by our Constitution with stalwart hearts and minds!

He was riding a bicycle with the children when he suffered a massive heart attack. Doug believes Yohan and Bryan Weaver are the first two chaplains to die on active duty since the Commission's founding in 1978.

- 7. That this trial will not also in time descend on the pulpits of our land.
